FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Library Budget, Trustee and Library Expansion Election Tuesday, April 5, 2022 12:00 Noon - 8:00 PM

In the words of Peter Noone of Herman's Hermits: 3rd Verse, Same as the First! We had planned to present the expansion project in April 2020, but the Governor cancelled that election. We tried again in April 2021, but since the pandemic had not diminished, we held off. It is now time to revisit and present the expansion project once again. In the past, we would save and then make necessary repairs and upgrades, and save again. We are asking for a *one-time* \$1 million appropriation to support a modest expansion. If approved, the average home assessed at \$3500 will be asked to support this expansion with a *one-time* approximate \$110 investment over the standard budget. Other municipalities ask for 20 or 30 years of larger annual bond payments. We are asking for *one-time* funding. This is a necessary project for the good of the community. We have saved enough to initiate the expansion, but not quite enough for completion. Grant applications will be submitted to help with this endeavor; we have been very successful in the past. More information is available throughout this issue of the *News and Notes* and in the Library.

Your Board of Trustees feels it is important to enlist the community's input and support in this venture.

We have invested in high efficiency a/c and heating, windows and doors, solar panels, LED lighting, high definition surveillance cameras and parking, to make our Library functional and sustainable in the 21st century. This expansion plan will address our ADA deficiencies. This is simply the next step.

This is the right thing to do. This is the right time. We are being transparent.


We strongly believe that this is an imperative project and we hope that you feel the same way. Be sure to cast your vote on April 5th.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What changes will be made?

We seek to build an accessible, ground level meeting room, accessible bathrooms and elevator access to the book stacks. We will repurpose other areas to include a quiet study area. These improvements are designed to bring the library in further compliance with the ADA and to make your visit to the Library better.

What is the ADA?

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life, including jobs, schools, transportation, and all public and private places that are open to the general public. The ADA became law in 1990. The purpose of the law is to make sure that people with disabilities have the same rights and opportunities as everyone else. The issue for our Library is accessibility. We are obligated to uphold this law.

Why do we need to do this?

The original design of the building does not accommodate the needs of the entire community. When we host a program in the basement meeting room and a patron is unable to negotiate the stairs, we move the program upstairs to the adult reading room or the children's room. This is inconsistent with a functional library. At least 50% or our programs have required relocation for ground level access.

How much will this cost the average taxpayer?

We will use our capital reserves - funds we have saved to pay for these types of improvements for the initial expenses. We are asking for your support of a *one-time* investment of approximately \$110. This is *not* a bond. It will *not* be repeated.

Will the Library be open during construction?

Yes, we plan to remain open through the construction, unless it becomes an issue of safety. Closings will be communicated with as much advance notice as possible.

Will we lose parking spaces?

We anticipate the loss of a few spaces, particularly during construction, as fencing will be erected around the construction site. At the conclusion, we will redefine the handicap parking spaces.

What are the expected additional expenses to maintain the new addition?

Our current custodial staffing will be able to handle the additional workload.

Is there a smaller option?

This is the most economical option that the Library and architects have developed. There is no Plan B.

What if the proposal is not approved?

We will be unable to address the needs of our patrons. Programs will continue to be moved upstairs or cancelled. Relocated programs disrupt the regular operations of the Library. Our patrons deserve better. We would operate under last year's budget.

What is the timeline for this project?

We will conduct an election on April 5, 2022. Once approved, we require State Education Department approval, followed by putting the project out to bid and seeking the lowest *responsible* bidder. Between announcement of the project, distribution of the bid packets, data and requirements, vetting and successful contract with the winning bidder, work could begin as early as Winter 2023, with an anticipated 9 – 12 month construction period. Once we have SED plan approval, we should be able to better estimate the project timeline.

Are grants available?

Yes. Our track record has been exceptional. We received the largest grant in the history of the Library Construction Aid program when we expanded our parking lot. We expect continued success.

Who can vote on this proposition?

Any registered North Babylon School District resident may vote. Voter information is on page 5.

Do I have to register to vote?

Yes. Registration information is on page 5.

I won't be here on the date of the election. Are absentee ballots available?

Yes. Absentee ballot information is on page 5.

Will there be a public hearing to discuss the budget and the expansion?

Yes. Prior to the March 15, 2022 Board meeting (6:00 PM), there will be a special meeting to review the budget and proposition. The Board of Trustees and the Library Director will be in attendance. You are always welcome to speak with the Library Director beforehand.

Voter Information

Who can vote: Anyone who is:

- 1. A citizen of the United States
- 2. At least 18 years of age
- 3. A resident of the North Babylon School District for a period of 30 days preceding the election.

Who is registered: All persons who were registered for and who voted in any North Babylon School District or Library election within four years prior to April 5, 2022 are eligible to vote in this election. Any district resident who is qualified to vote in general elections and who remains qualified to vote from the residence address from which s/he registered and who has voted in a general election within the last four years is qualified to vote in the library election.

Annual Budget Vote and Trustee Election: Tuesday, April 5 12:00 Noon - 8:00 PM in the Library

From Your Board of Trustees

For your approval, the Board has assembled a budget that includes our expansion plan. The budget increase is 1.65%, below the tax cap, plus an additional one million dollars to complete our very modest expansion. This additional budget line bumps us over the tax cap. We are unable to separate the expansion request from the annual budget.

The expansion project addresses accessibility issues. We desperately need an accessible meeting room, accessible bathrooms and elevator access to the book stacks. This is no longer an option; these improvements are designed to bring the library in further compliance with the ADA.

We have contracted with H2M Architects, a firm with a long history of library experience. The developed design that you will vote upon is a reasonable plan to address the needs of the community while remaining fiscally conservative.

This additional investment will add approximately \$110 per house to next year's library tax levy. We have saved enough to initiate the expansion, but short of completion. We commit to our tax paying community that this will be a *one-time* request. It is *not* a continuing bond issue. It does *not* require spending hundreds of thousands of dollars with a bonding agent.

We know that you value the service provided and we know that the Library is an essential service within the community.

We have never asked for your financial support in upgrading your library; this is a different situation. In the past we have anticipated expenses and saved accordingly. Every other project we accomplished was done without extra financial support, this expansion is unique.

If we did not have to address the accessibility issues, we would have remained well below the NYS tax cap.

If you agree with our plan, we urge you to come down on April 5th and demonstrate your support.
